Their honor, like their nation remained intact.

David Smith is our April Speaker. He wrote a book about the Armstrong brothers who were Pennsylvanians who fought for the Patriots and eventually marched to Virginia circa 1781.



David O. Smith is a Distinguished Fellow with the South Asia Program at the Stimson Center, a nonpartisan policy research center in Washington, D.C. He retired from government service in 2012 after serving in a senior position in the Defense Intelligence Agency. Prior to that he was Senior Country Director for Pakistan in the Office of the Under Secretary of Defense (Policy) in the Department of Defense. During thirty-one years of service in the U.S. Army, he served in a wide variety of field artillery assignments and spent 22 years dealing with politico-military issues in the Near East and South Asia. He remains actively engaged in a variety of quasi-official (Track 2) engagements with both Pakistan and India.

He is the author of *The Quetta Experience: A Study of Attitudes and Values Within the Pakistan Army*, published by The Woodrow Wilson Center in 2018; *The Wellington Experience: A Study of Attitudes and Values Within the Indian Army*, published by the Stimson Center in 2020; and *The Armstrong Brother: One Pennsylvania Family's Contribution to Victory in the American Revolution*, published by Xlibris in 2021.

Westmoreland County Ceremony – Saturday, April 22

Starting at **10:00 a.m.**, at the Birthplace, the 265th anniversary ceremonies are expected to include local and state elected officials. The formal ceremony will commence at **10:30 a.m.** Come to see both the Birthplace House and the exhibits at the Visitor Center.

Many of you were able to join us in October 2021 for the grand opening ceremony of the Birthplace House, and again in April 2022. Whether you could make it then or not, we hope that you will come back on April 22 to see the Birthplace House again. We had approximately fifty lineage societies and other groups presenting wreaths at the grand opening ceremony. We hope to repeat that this spring. The ceremony will be in front of the Birthplace House again, rather than in front of the Visitor Center.

Hollywood Cemetery Ceremony – Friday, April 28

This year our annual wreath-laying ceremony at President Monroe's tomb in Hollywood Cemetery in Richmond will be at **11:00 a.m.** Friday morning (subject to any changes in the start time by the Army, which schedules the ceremony). April 28 is President Monroe's actual birthday, and the White House military protocol rules require that the ceremony be held on that day. The Army's portion of the ceremony normally consists of a speech on behalf of the President delivered by an Army general,

Please remember that President Monroe was the only President besides George Washington to have actively served in the regular army during the Revolutionary War, participating in six major battles (as well as wintering at Valley Forge, crossing the Delaware with George Washington, being seriously wounded at Trenton and cited for conspicuous bravery) and subsequently served simultaneously as Secretary of War and Secretary of State (during the War of 1812, when he helped coordinate American defenses against the British). He was also an active participant in our first American lineage society, the Society of the Cincinnati.



“Book of the month”

Oxford University Press Date: June 4, 2007 Hard back, 704 pages, 40 illustrations with 20 maps



In this gripping chronicle of America's struggle for independence, award-winning historian John Ferling transports readers to the grim realities of that war, capturing an eight-year conflict filled with heroism, suffering, cowardice, betrayal, and fierce dedication. As Ferling demonstrates, it was a war that America came much closer to losing than is now usually remembered. General George Washington put it best when he said that the American victory was "little short of a standing miracle."

Almost a Miracle offers an illuminating portrait of America's triumph, offering vivid descriptions of all the major engagements, from the first shots fired on Lexington Green to the surrender of General Cornwallis at Yorktown, revealing how these battles often hinged on intangibles such as leadership under fire, heroism, good fortune, blunders, tenacity, and surprise. The author paints sharp-eyed portraits of the key figures in the war, including General Washington and other American officers and civilian leaders. Some do not always measure up to their iconic reputations, including Washington himself.

Others, such as the quirky, acerbic Charles Lee, are seen in a much better light than usual. The book also examines the many faceless men who soldiered, often for years on end, braving untold dangers and enduring abounding miseries. The author explains why they served and sacrificed, and sees them as the forgotten heroes who won American independence. Ferling's narrative is also filled with compassion for the men who comprised the British army and who, like their American counterparts, struggled and died at an astonishing rate in this harsh war. Nor does Ferling ignore the naval war, describing dangerous patrols and grand and dazzling naval actions.

Finally, "Almost a Miracle" takes readers inside the legislative chambers and plush offices of diplomats to reveal countless decisions that altered the course of this war. The story that unfolds is at times a tale of folly, at times one of appalling misinformation and confusion, and now and then one of insightful and dauntless statesmanship.

About the author: Throughout his long career, historian John Ferling has specialized in the American Revolution. He taught numerous courses on the Revolution, America's Founders, and U. S. military history. He is the author of thirteen books, all but two of which have dealt with the American Revolution and its leaders.



Biographical Sketch of Jonathan Curtis (1754-ca 1833)



Jonathan Curtis was born in June 1754 in Spencer, Massachusetts and baptized on the 19th day of that month. Among seven children, he was the only son of John Curtis (1708-ca 1786) and Mary Spear (1715- ca 1786), who both descended from old New England families. As the American Revolution dawned, Jonathan took up arms in Fall 1775 and served as a Massachusetts Militia private during the Siege of Boston. His company commander was Capt. John Cowls (1731-1811), and his regimental commander was Col. Benjamin Ruggles Woodbridge (1739-1819), who later served under Maj. Gen. Benjamin Lincoln during the Pawlet Expedition. In September 1777, Jonathan commenced service for a second time as a Massachusetts Militia private during the Saratoga Campaign. Specifically, he served in the 5th Worcester County Militia Regiment that was commanded by Col. Jonathan Holman (1732-1814), a Continental Army veteran who was an ancestor of U.S. President William Howard Taft. In addition, Jonathan's company commander, Capt. John Nichols (1734-1812), was the father-in-law of a niece of Brig. Gen. Rufus Putnam. The 5th Worcester County Regiment departed Charlton, Massachusetts on 27 September 1777, to reinforce the growing army commanded by Maj. Gen. Horatio Gates at Saratoga. Assigned to a Massachusetts Militia brigade commanded by Brig. Gen. Jonathan Warner (1741-1803), it is unclear whether Jonathan and the rest of the 5th Worcester County Regiment arrived in time to participate in the Second Battle of Saratoga on 7 October 1777. However, they undoubtedly would have witnessed the surrender of Gen. John Burgoyne's army on October 17th. Following this service, Jonathan returned to Charlton and in January 1778 married his first wife, Dolly Wilson, who passed away shortly thereafter. Jonathan then married Sybil (aka Sybilla) Haven in October 1780 and went on to have three children – Eli Curtis (1784-1852), Lucinda Curtis (1793-1867), and Ezra Curtis (1797-1859). After the War of 1812, the Curtis clan was among the mass migration of New Englanders who went to Ohio, where they quickly became an established and prosperous pioneer family. Jonathan and Sybil first lived in Marietta, Ohio but later moved to nearby Carlisle, which was located in what is now Noble County. The last historical reference to Jonathan was in 1833, when he appeared on a Noble County tax list. His year of death is unclear, but it is believed that Jonathan is buried in the Curtis-Ridge Cemetery, located in Noble County's Stock Township. Considering his Patriotic service from Boston to Saratoga, and his noteworthy role as an early Ohio pioneer, Jonathan Curtis' life was a life well lived.



All chapter members have put a significant amount of time in researching your Patriot. 1775 This is the flag of the First Pennsylvania Rifles. The regiment would see action during the New York Campaign, Battle of Trenton, Second Battle of Trenton, Battle of Princeton, Battle of Brandywine, Battle of Germantown, Battle of Monmouth and the Battle of Springfield.

Colors of the First Pennsylvania Rifles

The letters "P.M." on the flag refers to "Pennsylvania Militia," and the "i.R." is "1st Rifles." The Latin legend "Dominari Nolo" means "I Will Not Be Dominated" and refers to the American's desire to be free from the King of England.

From the Chaplain Jim Morford

Many years ago, back in the 1950s, I was introduced to a book by J. B. Phillips with the title *Your God is Too Small*. Even 70 years ago I was wrestling with understanding what God is.

Phillips (1906-1982) born in the UK was a Bible scholar, translator, author, and, Anglican clergyman. His writings challenge much of Christian orthodoxy.

In *Your God is Too Small* Phillips dissects the understandings of what God is - understandings that were instilled in us as children and which we carry with us to this day – our little gods.

When I look at pictures of the universe revealed to us through the Hubble Telescope and more recently through the James Webb Space Telescope, I am in awe of its beauty and how incredibly immense the visible universe is. Then I contemplate with an increasing sense of wonder how tiny our Earth is. On this small planet, orbiting a medium size sun in an average size galaxy containing billions of suns, circling the center of the Milky Way at a speed of 140 miles a second, and taking about 200 million years to complete one orbit, I think of the Psalmist who raised his voice to the heavens and sang to his God, “What is man that thou art mindful of him?” By what miracle do we exist?

Phillips wrote, “The trouble with many people today is that they have not found a God big enough for modern needs. While their experience of life has grown in a score of directions, and their mental horizons have been expanded to the point of bewilderment by world events and by scientific discoveries, their ideas of God have remained largely static.”

As we mature, Phillips asserts, many have experienced enough of life to know that God is immeasurably “bigger” than our forefathers imagined, and modern scientific discoveries confirm that we have only just begun to comprehend the incredibly complex being that is the force that created life as we know it on this planet.

Throughout history humans have worshiped many gods and if some could find no god they worshiped something. Substitutes include the State, wealth, power, the environment. They are not called “God”, but these substitutes influence behavior and demand devotion

Phillips asserts, “We have not only to be impressed by the “size” and unlimited power of God, we have to be moved to genuine admiration, respect, and affection, if we are ever to worship Him.”

Eternal God, omniscient and omnipresent, creator of the universe, help us to accept that you are greater than our ability to fully grasp. May we be guided in our daily lives by the wisdom of the Commandments given to Moses, the words of the prophets and the teachings of your only son.
