President's Message

Compatriots,

Our Chapter activities in March started off with a first time event for us. On March 2^{nd} , we hosted our first Williamsburg-based Color Guard training activity. Nine color guardsmen participated; six from the Williamsburg Chapter (Ron Adolphi, Mike Doucette, Gary Dunaway, Alex Johnston, John Lynch, Ron Miller, and Dave Westenberger) two from the Thomas Nelson Chapter (Jeff Brown and Gary Hodges) and one, the instructor, from the Norfolk Chapter (Kimball Thompson). Training focused on musket drill and also safety threats at an event.

Mid-month Compatriot Steve McGuffin presented our Chapter Wreath at Montpelier Plantation during the commemoration of James Madison's birthday. Color Guard Commander Gary Dunaway attended a grave marking for two patriots in Northern Virginia. Gary also took part in color guard training held in Leesburg. He passed the exams to be a VASSAR musket squad safety officer and a VASSAR color guard instructor.

At the end of March, Compatriot Lynch attended the three day *A Common Cause to All* conference held at Colonial Williamsburg. The conference brought together about 450 American Revolution 250th planners from 37 states and 46 counties in Virginia. Our final event this month was also a first for the Chapter: our color guard supported the opening ceremony the Virginia Daughters of the American Revolution's 128th State Conference. This was held at the Williamsburg Lodge on March 22nd.

The Eagle Scout program was busy – it awarded seven Eagle Scout certificates this month. Eleven certificates were awarded so far this year. March was tempered by the somber news of three of our chapter members passing: Benjamin Harris of Wicomico, Duncan McIver of Williamsburg, and Jay Smith, of Williamsburg. Additionally one of our members lost a daughter. The Chapter's condolences to the affected families were sent by Chaplain George Corbett and Chaplain emeritus Jim Morford.

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Tidewater Virginia Patriot of the Month: Nathaniel Burwell

Nathaniel Burwell (1750-1814) was born on April 15, 1750, an Easter Sunday, at Carter's Grove plantation in James City County, the son of Carter Burwell and Lucy Ludwell Grymes Burwell. He attended the College of William and Mary, beginning in the grammar school, and continued to study past his twenty-second birthday. His father died when Burwell was six, and when he came of age in 1771 he inherited control of a large landed estate in Tidewater Virginia and in the lower Shenandoah Valley, including his father's Carter's Grove plantation and mansion in James City County. On November 28, 1772, Burwell married his cousin Susanna Grymes, of Middlesex County. They had seven sons and one daughter before her death on July 24, 1788.

During Burwell's management of Carter's Grove the plantation prospered. Burwell was appointed to the James City County Court on November 6, 1772, was a colonel in the militia by 1774, and served on the James City County Committee that same year. On November 27, 1776, he became county lieutenant, the commander of the county's militia. Burwell represented James City County in the House of Delegates in 1778 and 1779 and served on the Committee of Propositions and Grievances during both years and on the Committee of Religion in 1779. Burwell was also one of the directors of the Public Hospital in Williamsburg.

In 1788 Burwell was one of two men elected to represent James City County in a convention called to consider the proposed constitution of the United States. He did not take an active part in the debates, but his opinions were well known. Burwell voted against insisting on amendments prior to ratification and against reducing the taxing power of Congress, and on June 25, 1788, he voted to ratify the Constitution (Source: *Encyclopedia Virginia*).





Flags of the American Revolution

The oldest known American Battle flag, this banner was flown by the Bedford Minutemen Company at the Battle of Lexington and Concord and onward.

It was the first flag of the American Revolution to be fired upon by the British.

The flag features an armored arm wielding a sword and protruding from a cloud. It also contains the powerful words "Vince aut Morire," which translates to "Conquer or Die." It has been preserved to this day from its time in the Massachusetts Militia, and remains in Bedford, Massachusetts.







Did You Know???

The British Army in America numbered about 42,000 soldiers over the course of the conflict. The British government purchased the services of about 30,000 troops from various German princes. These hired soldiers were called Hessians. The British also received significant assistance from loyalists—American colonists who remained loyal to Great Britain during the war—and from various Native American tribes (Source: *Britannica*).


Who Fired That Shot

On 18 April 1775, Dr. Joseph Warren received information that the British planned to march to Concord, MA and seize the arms that were stored there. Two riders weredispatched to warn the militias of the situation. On 19 April 1775, the British force of approximately 700 men arrived at Lexington, MA to encounter 77 militiamen with weapons. The British demanded that they lay down their weapons and they, of course, refused. At some point a shot rang out and a skirmish ensued between the two forces. At the end, 8 militiamen were dead and 9 wounded with one British wounded. I thought that this would be a piece of history to reflect upon as we enter the month of April. 251 years ago, a basically untrained force of militiamen faced 700 trained troops of the British army. They had the chance to simply lay down their weapons, but chose not to do that. Now, I place myself in one of their places then and think "What would I have done"? A very interesting and difficult question to answer given that time. Frankly, I really don't know the answer. I wonder, honestly, how any of us would have reacted to the situation in that time. We have pledged ourselves to defend our way of life "against any foe". Easy to say today in our comfortable life of this time. And oh, by the way, no one really knows who fired that shot said to have been heard around the world. Blessings to everyone.



IN THE MINDS AND HEARTS OF THE PEOPLE.

Prologue to the American Revolution: 1760-1774

By Lillian Miller, Historian of the National Portrait Gallery.

238 pages, with color, black & white illustrations

The years preceding the American Revolution were characterized by violent political dissension and social unrest. This unique book, by presenting the portraits and biographies of numerous figures in the colonies and in England, vividly recreates the stormy events leading to the First Continental Congress. Here we see, in John Adams's words, the "radical change in the principles, opinions, sentiments, and affections of the people that was the real American Revolution."

The book also selects certain key political issues and brings them into dramatic focus through the personalities of the day. This is the story of the fateful shifts in colonial policy that were set in motion after the French and Indian War. In successive personality sketches, the reader meets the colonists who reacted to these imperial decisions as British encroachments upon their constitutional rights. The American Revolution was born, as John Adams went on to say, in the minds and hearts of the colonists once they were forced to realize their separate identity under the pressure of policies and events that goaded them to violent resistance.

Abundantly illustrated with portraits and other revealing materials (a wide variety of documents, including broadsides, maps, and treaties) that have never been assembled before, this book provides an intimate close-up of American society just before the Revolution formally began. In addition to authentic life-portraits of the many famous British and American figures who dominated the history of the period, this book introduces portraits and records of less well-known but pivotal individuals. Marvin Sadik, the Director of the National Portrait Gallery, has summed up the importance of these portraits: "The portraits reproduced in these pages are not intended merely to illustrate the text but to stand as historic documents in themselves. The portrait, because it is a visual record of a person and an era, bears honest witness to each sitter's true role in the American experience; and it deserves to be studied as a critical piece of evidence, in its own right. The National Portrait Gallery seeks to illumine and enliven American history by bringing to it this extra dimension of personal reality as conveyed by the portrait and by the biographical approach...."
