# Honoring Dr. William Rickman

#### Williamsburg Chapter SAR honors a Continental Army Surgeon

On 25 November 2025, Williamsburg Chapter SAR Compatriots John Lynch, Bruce Laubach, and Ron Miller visited Kittiewan Plantation in Charles City County to see the grave of senior Continental Army surgeon Dr. William Rickman (who has once owned that plantation). Dr. Rickman held of the rank of colonel in the Continental Army and was in active service between 1776 and 1780, helping to oversee military hospitals in Williamsburg and other places. He was married to Elizabeth "Betsey" Harrison, a daughter of Benjamin Harrison V, who was a signer of the Declaration of Independence and the owner of nearby Berkeley Plantation. 





## Revolutionary War History of the Month Submitted by Stuart Butler, Chapter Historian

#### Was Mount Vernon Ever Occupied By the British?

The answer is no, but it could have been. Last month's newsletter account of the British naval force in the Potomac in the spring of 1781 indicated that a small British naval force had penetrated the upper Potomac all the way to Alexandria. Had the British desired to do so, it was in their power to occupy or ravage the grounds of Mount Vernon. Why didn't they? While Washington was away commanding the Continental Army, he entrusted the management of his eight-thousand-acre plantation, along with Mount Vernon, to his distant cousin, Lund Washington. The British naval force under the command of Capt. Richard Graves had reached the vicinity of Mount Vernon in early April 1781 and had burned neighboring plantations across the Potomac in Maryland and appeared to be on its way to Mount Vernon. Graves demanded provisions from Lund with the implied threat that Washington's property would be threatened if the request was denied. Lund initially refused to cooperate, but after Graves brought his 16 gunship, Savage, closer to the shore, Lund met the captain with a small gift of poultry. At Graves' invitation, Lund later went aboard the ship. Soon after Lund's departure, a number of sheep, hogs, and other provisions were received on board.

While this exchange was underway, about seventeen enslaved persons absconded and were taken aboard the Savage. Although Lund's letter to Washington describing the incident is lost, it is known through other sources, that Captain Graves appeared to have no plans to ravage Mount Vernon and that nothing "could compel him to entertain the idea of taking the smallest measure offensive to so illustrious a character as General Washington." (Marquis de Chastallux, Travels in North America in the Years 1780, 1781, and 1782, Vol 2, 597-98). Although thankful that his property was not ravaged, the General was, nevertheless, not amused by his cousin's performance. In a letter to Lund, April 30, 1781, he expressed his dissatisfaction with his cousin's behavior towards the British. While he understood his cousin's actions were done to avoid destruction, as Lund had no means to defend the property, "but to go onboard their vessels; carry them refreshments; commune with a parcel of plundering scoundrels, and request a favor by asking the surrender of my Negroes, was exceedingly ill-judged..." Washington went on to imply that it would have been better to have his property despoiled than do business with the enemy. Despite the incident at Mount Vernon, Washington kept Lund on until after the war. Most of the enslaved persons seeking freedom on board Savage, were returned to Washington after the war.


## Chaplain's Corner – By George Corbett, Chaplain
