The 1781 engagement at Spencer's Ordinary took place 26 June 1781 between Patriot forces (Virginia militia and a detachment of Continentals) and British troops (John Simcoe's Queens Rangers and an attached unit of German Jaegers). Both sides failed in their primary mission: the Patriots to cut off and capture the British foraging party: the British to bring back cattle to Cornwallis' main army in Williamsburg. Simcoe's troops were forced to retreat from the battle after being flanked but were shortly thereafter met by British troops marching from Williamsburg. British returned to hold the deserted battlefield. The Patriots recovered the cattle and then rapidly withdrew. Today Freedom Park, the intersection of Longhill and Centerville Roads, the gas station adjacent to the intersection, and the veterinary clinic across the street from the gas station are found within the bounds of this Revolutionary War battle.

The service will be broadcast live on Bruton's YouTube channel and will also be available for viewing for some period after the 4th.



Colors of the First Battalion Westmoreland County Volunteers 1775



1st Battalion Standard

This was the Rattlesnake Flag of Colonel John Proctor's 1st Battalion from Westmoreland County, Pennsylvania. Westmoreland County was the farthest western part of Pennsylvania during the American Revolution. Formed in May of 1775, the First Battalion was comprised of volunteers and except for few months with Washington's army in 1777, the Battalion was used defending Western Pennsylvania against British-inspired Indian raids.

Their arms were mostly privately owned, and their clothing was typical of civilians on the frontier. Apparently only the officers could afford or wore uniforms.

According to tradition this flag was made in 1775 at Hanna's Town from a preexisting British standard. The initials "J.P." and "I.B.W.C.P." stand for Colonel John Proctor's "Independent Battalion, Westmoreland County, Pennsylvania." The retention of the British symbol on the flag suggests that the inhabitants of Westmoreland County, although ready to resist the British Parliament, still considered themselves loyal subjects of King George III in 1775.

From the Chaplain Jim Morford

A few issues back I used this space to profile the great song writer Irving Berlin, his iconic tribute *God Bless America*, and its powerful message for us today. There is another story connected to the great song also with a message for today.

It was on the evening of November 10, 1938 that one of the country's best known entertainers, Kate Smith, sang a new song to honor the 20th anniversary of the end of WW I.

In introducing it, Smith said, "It's something more than a song -I feel it's one of the most beautiful compositions ever written, a song that will never die."

She usually included the song in her radio broadcasts. It became her signature song during her five-decade career. Some considered it to be our second national anthem.

Smith and Berlin added a verse that also carries a powerful message for today:

While the storm clouds gather far across the sea, Let us swear allegiance to a land that's free, Let us all be grateful for a land so fair, As we raise our voices in solemn prayer.

As in 1938 when storm clouds gathered over Europe they are gathering there again today.

Kate Smith's rendition of *God Bless America* became the good-luck charm for the Philadelphia Flyers hockey team and following 9/11 was regularly sung during the seventh inning stretch at Yankee Stadium.

More than three decades after Kate Smith's death, America's Woke, and Cancel Culture discovered she had sung two songs in the 1930s that are unquestionably racist and unacceptable today. In an act of automatic submission the Flyers stopped playing God Bless America and tore down her statue. In a similar act the Yankees ceased playing her rendition of the song. Censoring the long deceased because of actions not acceptable to today's determiners of what is correct is not just sad, it is dangerous to a free society.

In these days of gathering clouds let us turn to God to affirm our allegiance and express our gratitude.

Let us pray:

God of our fathers, You are the rock upon which this great nation was founded.

Every generation has faced challenges to our fundamental freedoms and this generation is no exception.



Was adopted by the Second Continental Congress on July 5, 1775, and signed on July 8 in a final attempt to avoid war between Great Britain and the The Olive Branch Petition was adopted by the Second Continental Congress on July 5, 1775, and signed on July 8 in a final attempt to avoid war between Great Britain and the Thirteen Colonies in America. The Congress had already authorized the invasion of Canada more than a week earlier, but the petition affirmed American loyalty to Great Britain and beseeched King George III to prevent further conflict. It was followed by the July 6 Declaration of the Causes and Necessity of Taking Up Arms, however, which made its success unlikely in London. In August 1775, the colonies were formally declared to be in rebellion by the Proclamation of Rebellion, and the petition was rejected by the British government; King George had refused to read it before declaring the colonists traitors in America.



George Washington: A Collection by Washington, George

"Book of the month"

George Washington speaks for himself on behalf of liberty and the emerging American republic in this handsome book, the only "one-volume" compilation in print of his vast writings. While Washington is recognized as a military leader and the great symbolic figure of the early republic, many fail to appreciate the full measure of his contributions to the country. In these selections, his political ideas and judgments stand out with remarkable clarity. His writings are replete with sustained, thoughtful commentary and keen political insight.

This volume also includes assorted selections of his writings including official correspondence, journals, letters and all of his presidential addresses, various public proclamations, his last will and testament.

Review: Excellent book to have in your personal library about one of our most admired founding fathers. It is a good resource book for George Washington on his views about life, ambition, politics, government, military experience (including much from his time as Command-in-Chief during the American Revolution and personal relationships. You can read exactly what George Washington penned, instead of reading what somebody else paraphrased or said he wrote.



Turner Lee Wilkerson III A National Trustee of the SAR and as a duel member of the Williamsburg Chapter of the SAR represented our chapter for the Wreath laying. For his participation in the ceremony the Williamsburg Chapter received a streamer for our chapter Flag.



George Rogers Clark

Born November 19, 1752, George Rogers Clark, was an American surveyor, soldier, and militia officer from Virginia who became the highest-ranking American patriot military officer on the northwestern frontier during the American Revolution. He served as leader of the militia in Kentucky (then part of Virginia) throughout much of the war. He is best known for his captures of Kaskaskia (1778) and Vincennes (1779) during the Illinois Campaign, which greatly weakened British influence in the Northwest Territory. The British ceded the entire Northwest Territory to the United States in the 1783 Treaty of Paris, and Clark has often been hailed as the "Conqueror of the Old Northwest".

Clark's major military achievements occurred before his thirtieth birthday. Afterward, he led militia in the opening engagements of the Northwest Indian War. He left Kentucky to live on the Indiana frontier but was never fully reimbursed by Virginia for his wartime expenditures. During the final decades of his life, he worked to evade creditors and suffered living in increasing poverty and obscurity. After suffering a stroke and the amputation of his right leg, he became an invalid. He was aided in his final years by family members. He died of a stroke on February 13, 1818.

Road to Revolution: Leatherwood 1779-1799 Only Unexplored Home of Founding Father Patrick Henry

- This was Patrick Henry's home during the Revolutionary War, a 10,000-acre estate that he co-owned with Col. George Waller
- Henry moved to this home in Henry County after serving as Virginia's wartime Governor from 1776-1779, he served in the House of Delegates from 1780-1784 while living here
- Henry still owned more than 5,000 acres at Leatherwood when he died
- Granite marker erected in 1922 by the DAR marked the estate, not the home's location


