


### July 12, 2025 Meeting Speaker: Evan Bell

Evan Bell is an archaeologist at The Colonial Williamsburg
Foundation where he focuses on the analysis of material culture,
and historical research. Before working at Colonial Williamsburg, he
graduated from the University of Virginia and worked at the Thomas
Jefferson Foundation. While at Colonial Williamsburg his work has
included mapping the enslaved communities of the Custis family on
the Eastern Shore, researching the possible identities of
Confederate remains discovered at the Powder Magazine, and
cataloging artifacts from the excavations at Custis Square, the
Williamsburg Barracks, and the future Campbell Archaeology
Center.


### The Battle of Green Spring (from Wikipedia)

The Battle of Green Spring took place near Green Spring Plantation in James City County, Virginia during the American Revolutionary War. On July 6, 1781 United States Brigadier General "Mad" Anthony Wayne, leading the advance forces of the Marquis de Lafayette, was ambushed near the plantation by the British army of Earl Charles Cornwallis in the last major land battle of the Virginia campaign prior to the Siege of Yorktown.


Following a month of marching and countermarching in central Virginia by Cornwallis and Lafayette, Cornwallis in late June moved to Williamsburg, where he received orders to move to Portsmouth and send some of his army to New York City.

Lafayette followed Cornwallis fairly closely, emboldened by the arrival of reinforcements to consider making attacks on the British force. On July 4, Cornwallis departed Williamsburg for Jamestown, planning to cross the James River en route to Portsmouth. Lafayette believed he could stage an attack on Cornwallis's rear guard during the crossing.

Cornwallis anticipated Lafayette's idea, and laid an elaborate trap. General Wayne's forces were very nearly caught in the trap, and only a bold bayonet charge against the numerically superior British enabled his forces to retreat. Cornwallis did not follow the victory with pursuit, instead following his plan to cross the river. The action reinforced the perception among contemporaries that justified the moniker "Mad" to describe Wayne, although opinion on the merits of his actions was divided. The battlefield has been partially preserved, and reenactments are sometimes staged.


#### The Hot Days of Summer



# Virginia's Continentals, 1778-1783 – Volume Two By Michael Cecere

This is the second and final volume of Michael Cecere's series on the history of the Virginia Continental units which fought during our War of Independence from Great Britain. Volume One was raffled off during our last Chapter Luncheon.

By 1778, enthusiasm among Virginians for the Revolutionary War had peaked as had the troop strength of the Virginia continental line. What began as two continental regiments in 1775, grew to sixteen regiments (and two state regiments attached to the continental line) as well as a regiment of artillery and two regiments of light dragoons by 1777. Thousands of volunteers from Virginia — enlisted for two and three-year terms — served in four Virginia brigades and played a crucial role at the battles of Trenton, Princeton, Brandywine, Saratoga, and Germantown.

By the winter of 1777-78, these troops were encamped at Valley Forge and the troop strength of their regiments just a fraction of what they had started at. Efforts to replace the losses, exacerbated by war fatigue and the expiration of the two-year enlistments of the troops in the 1st thru 9th Virginia Regiments, proved disappointing. Despite the implementation of the first of several militia drafts and the transfer of two state regiments to continental service, the Virginia continental line would never again reach the troop strength of its 1777 peak. Because of the need to increase troop strength, he sent the supernumerary officers back to Virginia to recruit. Virginians continued to serve at the battles of Monmouth, Stony Point and Powles Hook, but by the end of 1779, what was left of the Virginia continental line was sent South to reinforce the American southern army at Charleston. The surrender of this army to the British in May 1780 gutted the Virginia line, but leaders pressed on and formed new continental detachments, largely from 18-month draftees (levies). The story of the Virginia Continental line's service from 1778 until the end of the war is the focus of this book.

Maps, a bibliography, and an index to full-names, places and subjects add to the value of this work.
