## President's Message

Compatriots,

Last month was a busy and successful one for our chapter. We held three significant events: The May 3 commemoration of the 250th anniversary of Virginia' Response to the Powder Incident, the repair and rededication of the SAR memorial stone at Elam Cemetery on May 25, and our Memorial Day ceremony with the Colonial Williamsburg Foundation. Our color guard supported the opening ceremonies for Lions Club Virginia State Conference on May 2. Three members of our chapter's color guard marched in a parade in Fredericksburg on May 4. The parade was sponsored by the Washington Heritage Museums and celebrated the Mary Washington Monument in Fredericksburg.

The commemoration of the Powder Incident is particularly noteworthy in that 19 VSSAR chapters, 10 VSDAR chapters, two V.S.C.A.R. chapters, and seven lineage societies were represented. Approximately 250 people attended the commemoration.

This month we will initiate a relaxed dress code for our luncheons and our commemorations of the Spencer's Ordinary and Green Spring battles. 



### Revolutionary War History Fact of the Month

### What happened to Governor Dunmore after Virginia? (Submitted by Stuart Butler, Chapter Historian)

John Murray, 4th Earl of Dunmore, former governor of Virginia, was a bitter man following his failure to retain Virginia for the British crown in 1776. By August 1776, Dunmore was in New York still hoping to interest the British military commanders that he could win back Virginia by raising a loyalist force in western Virginia. This idea, not surprisingly, went nowhere, and Dunmore sailed on November 12, 1776, for London, never to return to Virginia. He re-entered politics as a lord in the House of Lords and became the chief apologist for loyalist refugees in Britain. In 1777 he was awarded £15,000 in compensation for his losses in Virginia. By December 1781, he was at Charleston, South Carolina, and learned of General Cornwallis' defeat at Yorktown. Dunmore tried to interest the Crown in settling loyalists in the backcountry of the West, with the aim of forming an army to reclaim western parts of America, a plan that was again ignored by the British government. On February 25, 1784, Dunmore refiled additional claims due him from the new Loyalist Claims Commission and was awarded with an additional £15,000.

With friends in high places, Dunmore managed to wrangle the position of Royal Governor of the Bahamas in 1786. As in Virginia, he managed to alienate the lower house of government by refusing to hold elections, and placed his son as collector of customs and later as lieutenant governor. He spent lavishly on Government House (I.e. Palace), and constructed elaborate fortifications at Nassau that the colony's income could ill afford. He barely survived a petition for his recall. Adding to his woes was the fact that his oldest daughter, Lady Augusta, secretly married a younger son of King George III, without the King's approval, which was unlawful. The scandal help cause Dunmore's removal as governor and he was dismissed in July 1796. His daughter's marriage was annulled but she was given a large pension instead. In the end, Lord and Lady Dunmore retired with a £600 pension and moved to Ramsgate in Kent, where he died on February 25, 1809. They were buried at the Church of St. Laurence, Thanet, Kent.

### **Old Glory**


As we begin the month of June, I am preparing to replace my outside US flag with a new one on 14 June, Flag Day. In preparing this article for The Magazine, I did some research on our nation's flag. It is popularly believed that the first "official" flag of our nation was sewn by a Philadelphia flag maker, Elizabeth Griscom, also known as Betsy Ross, in June 1776. While a popular story, there is no conclusive proof of this event.

The flag has undergone 27 versions in its history. On August 3, 1949, President Harry S. Truman officially declared 14 June as Flag Day. The last change to the flag was in 1959 when Alaska and Hawaii were admitted as states and two stars were added to its field. I remember as a school child the excitement of this historic event.

At each of our meetings and other events, we pledge allegiance to this flag. The pledge was adopted by the US Congress in 1942 and on 14 June 1954 two words, "Under God" were added to it. As we enter this patriotic time of the year with Flag Day and the 4th of July right after it, let us give thanks to our Creator for our patriot ancestors, and all those who came after them, for keeping its colors flying high all over the globe. May she wave proudly over the land of the free and the home of the brave forever.

Almighty God, our Heavenly father, in whose hands are the living and the dead, we give thee thanks for all those thy servants who have laid down their lives in the service of our country. Grant to them Thy mercy and the light of Thy presence, that the good work that thou has begun in them may be perfected. Through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.



### Second to No Man but the Commander in Chief, Hugh Mercer: American Patriot

General George Washington's positive assessment of Hugh Mercer was based on their nearly twenty-year acquaintance and friendship, a relationship that began in the French and Indian War. When the decade long political dispute with Great Britain turned violent in 1775, Virginia's political leaders considered Hugh Mercer for command of one of Virginia's two regiments of regular troops. After two close ballots, the Virginia Convention opted instead to appoint Virginia natives Patrick Henry and William Woodford to command. Mercer was selected a few months later to command the 3rd Virginia Regiment, but six months after his appointment, the Continental Congress elevated him to the rank of Brigadier General in the Continental Army and he left Virginia to assume command of the newly formed Flying Camp in New Jersey. While he served in the northern theatre, Mercer played a critical role in the battles of Trenton and Princeton, two battles that helped save the American army and American independence. Sadly, General Mercer did not live to see the victorious end to America's struggle; he was mortally wounded at the Battle of Princeton in 1777. This book seeks to chronicle Mercer's life and service. An appendix with a transcript of Mercer's Last Will and Testament, maps, a bibliography, and an index to full-names, places and subjects add to the value of this work.
