"Forgotten Patriots" during the Siege at Yorktown (Tom) has been a member of our Chapter for over 25 years. He was past President in 2001, 2002 and early on, he became dedicated to drawing more attention to the Revolutionary War Cemetery at the Governor's Palace in Colonial Williamsburg.

As a result of his commitment over the years, he has given talks about the "Forgotten Patriots" during the Siege at Yorktown. Tom presented this talk to our Chapter a few years ago (at the request of Ed Truslow, Chapter President at that time) and since we have many new members and officers, he will present it again

Tom states that the 2019 Veterans' Day Ceremony at the Revolutionary War Cemetery was probably the best of all the many events supported by the Chapter with CW.



Thomas G. Campbell, October speaker

Receiving his B.S. and M.S. degrees in electrical engineering from The Citadel and Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University ('67), respectively and Program for Management Development, Harvard Graduate School of Business ('90)' he was awarded as Fellow of the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE) had a great 40 year career at the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, Langley Research Center, Hampton, VA, starting from the beginning of the manned space program when assigned to the Special Activities Squadron (USAF) also the same unit as the seven original astronauts. Campbell designed numerous missile and satellite antennas as well as the development of large deployable reflector antennas and large inflatable reflectors and the high altitude phased array radar antennas for the Viking spacecraft, the first to soft land on Mars. Mr. Campbell's work appears in numerous NASA publications, conference and journal articles, authored or co-authored numerous reports, and he received numerous NASA achievement awards which included the NASA Outstanding Leadership Medal.

Tom is about to publish his book about WWII entitled "The Red Rebel of San Giovanni" to be out soon by Fulton Books Publishing. His next book is "Stone's River to Nashville," a Civil War Diary.

After retiring from NASA, Tom served as the Program Manager (Advanced Programs) for Applied EM, Inc., a member of the Hampton Roads Technology Incubator Center for small start-up companies. While at Applied EM, Campbell initiated a number of antenna research and development programs such as the development of Conformal Antenna Materials Technology (sponsored by Air Force Research Laboratory (AFRL)) which demonstrated the capability of "paint-on" antenna technology for aerospace applications. Campbell also completed the development of Conformal Space Suit Antennas for Enhanced EVA Communications and Wearable Computer Applications for NASA's Johnson Space Center. I sent everyone an email last month requesting your patriot biographies. I have received about 20 so far, so thanks to those who have already responded. That still leaves about 170 active chapter members whose patriot does not have a biography page in the Patriot Research System.

NSSAR has set a goal toward refining and improving our patriot database as we move toward the nation's 250th anniversary in 2026. We are in the process of transcribing over 100,000 member applications from 1889 to 1970, which are presently available only on Ancestry.com.

The information we provide now will help future generations of prospective compatriots research their patriot ancestor lineage. I am asking again if you can send me a short synopsis of your ancestor's service and life. Even a single paragraph is better than nothing. If you can support the information with documented sources (pension application, family history, etc.), even better. Please send in Word or text format.

Colors of the Commander-in-Chief Guards 1776



This regimental flag is one of several historical flags on display at the George Washington Masonic Memorial and Museum in Alexandra, Virginia.

There were also traitors in the Guards. Sergeant Hickey and a few others were involved in a plot to kidnap or assassinate General Washington. Hickey was tried and hung, but there are no records of what happened to the other members of the Guards who were accused.

The Williamsburg chapter, Sons of the American Revolution presented a NASSAR Flag recognition Certificate to VFW Post 4639 on 13 December 2021. The post was recognized for its proper display and care for the flag of our nation. Pictures L-R are Post Commander, Glenda Schan, and George Corbett, chapter flag recognition committee chairman. In 1776, General Washington had four soldiers hand-picked from each regiment of the Continental Line to form the "Commander-in-Chief's Guards" or "Life Guards." The Guards were under the command of Major Caleb Gibbs. The Guards not only protected General Washington, but were at times involved in military operations. They served General Washington until the unit was disbanded shortly after Yorktown.

Reflections on Thomas Jefferson A Man of Faith or a Cruel Enslaver?

What made Thomas Jefferson unique? Was it that he was a slave holder as is emphasized at his Monticello home these days?

It is true, Jefferson owned slaves and so did virtually every other plantation owner in the south as well as many farmers in the north.

The fact that Thomas Jefferson owned slaves is not what makes him unique.

Born in 1743 he was already proficient in Greek and Latin when he entered the College of William and Mary at age 16. He graduated after two years and in 1762 began reading law under George Wythe. In 1767 as a young lawyer he took seven cases on behalf of freedom-seeking slaves.

Jefferson served in the House of Burgesses from 1769 until 1775 during his tenure he pursued reforms to the institution of slavery.

As a delegate to the Continental Congress from Virginia he was named to a committee to write a statement declaring independence – a document he authored.

Among his many accomplishments he served as minister to France, the first Secretary of State, Vice President, two-term President of the United States, and founder of the University of Virginia.

A major achievement of Jefferson's presidency was the abolition of the slave trade.

In his own unique fashion, Thomas Jefferson was a deeply, albeit unconventional, religious man. His religious upbringing was, however, quite conventional. He was baptized, married, and buried in the Anglican/Episcopal tradition. He

meticulously cut up four copies of the Gospels (in English, French, Greek, and Latin), retaining only selected passages, without miracles, to create The Jefferson Bible, his own book for spiritual guidance.

Jefferson's Notes on the State of Virginia, first printed in 1784, urged a clear distinction between government and church responsibilities. He insisted that religious opinion was a private matter, exempt from government supervision.

One wonders, can any of his detractors hold a candle to Thomas Jefferson's accomplishments?

Thomas Jefferson openly prayed for the assistance of divine providence. Let us do the same.

Our Prayer:

Heavenly Father, in Your infinite goodness, grant us Your mercy.

We recognize that through your divine providence all people are created equal and are endowed by You with certain inalienable rights.

Our founding fathers prayed for Your divine guidance. Our nation was born out of prayer. We have prospered because of our faith in You. We have maintained our strength through prayer and by Your grace, our nation will be healed and restored.

You are our hope and our consolation. We believe in You. We trust in You. We pray that you will lead us on the right path and let virtue always be our guide.

Founding Martyr: The Life and Death of Dr. Joseph Warren, the American Revolution's Lost Hero.

Christian Di Spigna is a writer based in New York City and Williamsburg, Virginia. A regular speaker and volunteer at Colonial Williamsburg. Di Spigna is an expert on the history of the era and educates a wide array of audiences.

A rich and illuminating biography of America's forgotten Founding Father, the patriot physician and major general who fomented rebellion and died heroically at the battle of Bunker Hill on the brink of revolution

Little has been known of one of the most important figures in early American history, Dr. Joseph Warren, an architect of the colonial rebellion, and a man who might have led the country as Washington or Jefferson did had he not been martyred at Bunker Hill in 1775. Warren was involved in almost every major insurrectionary act in the Boston area for a decade, from the Stamp Act protests to the Boston Massacre to the Boston Tea Party, and his incendiary writings included the famous Suffolk Resolves, which helped unite the colonies against Britain and inspired the Declaration of Independence. Yet after his death, his life and legend faded, leaving his contemporaries to rise to fame in his place and obscuring his essential role in bringing America to independence.

Christian Di Spigna's definitive new biography of Warren is a loving work of historical excavation, the product of two decades of research and scores of newly unearthed primary-source documents that have given us this forgotten Founding Father anew. Following Warren from his farming childhood and years at Harvard through his professional success and political radicalization to his role in sparking the rebellion, Di Spigna's thoughtful, judicious retelling not only restores Warren to his rightful place in the pantheon of Revolutionary greats, it deepens our understanding of the nation's dramatic beginnings.

Road to Revolution: Leatherwood 1779-1799 Only Unexplored Home of Founding Father Patrick Henry
