The Battle of the Chesapeake, also known as the Battle of the Virginia Capes or simply the Battle of the Capes, was a crucial naval battle in the American Revolutionary War that took place near the mouth of the Chesapeake Bay on 5 September 1781. The combatants were a British fleet led by Rear Admiral Sir Thomas Graves and a French fleet led by Rear Admiral Francois Joseph Paul, the Comte de Grasse. The battle was strategically decisive, in that it prevented the Royal Navy from reinforcing or evacuating the besieged forces of Lieutenant General Lord Cornwallis at Yorktown, Virginia. The French were able to achieve control of the sea lanes against the British and provided the Franco-American army with siege artillery and French reinforcements. These proved decisive in the Siege of Yorktown, effectively securing independence for the Thirteen Colonies.

SAR Youth Programs

The Williamsburg Chapter will again be active in supporting the SAR Youth Programs for the students of the Williamsburg area. Working in partnership with the WJCC schools through their WJCC Community Partner program and continuing the success with the private and parochial schools, our chapter will offer programs to students in elementary through high school grades. The chapter provides an Elementary School Poster Contest; a Middle School Brochure Contest; a High School Essay Contest; and a High School Oration Contest. The past few years have shown that the middle school brochure contest is the most popular program and will continue to be a focus this year. In addition, we will offer a new and exciting program to the elementary and middle school students — The Patriot Chest.

The Patriot Chest program is an interactive presentation, intended to complement Elementary and Middle School lesson plans on the Revolutionary War and Colonial Period of American History. The program's purpose is to bring history alive, while providing students with a sense of the times, and appreciation of the Patriot men and women who founded our nations. The program teaches from two different Patriot Chests.


Small Chest This Patriot Chest contains 10 American flags from periods of our founding. The presentation is interactive with the students as the history behind each flag is presented.


Large Chest Suited for both elementary and middle school. The is an interactive presentation by chapter members, often in period dress, who present and explain items of the colonial period. Both presentations initiate active participation with the students, foster the exchange of ideas while introducing the various colonial items, and support basic history lessons about the Revolutionary War period.

George Washington and Nathanael Greene were the only general officers who served in that position throughout the war. Greene led his men in more battles than any other general officer, including Washington. Moreover, it was Greene who was constantly harassed by Congress, and ultimately forsaken by them. Three years after the official end of the war. Nathanael Greene was dead. The author claims his premature death was not only a result of the intense hardships of war, but the hardships and cruelty inflicted on him by the United States Congress.

Freedom's Cost: The Story of General Nathanael Greene by Janet Uhlar

When the Revolutionary War began, Nathanael Greene was a private in the militia, the lowest rank possible, yet he emerged from the war with a reputation as George Washington's most gifted and dependable officer--celebrated as one of three most important generals. His role as a major strategist in the War for Independence was second only to General George Washington. Born and reared a Quaker, with no military experience, he was promoted from private to brigadier general over night. Greene quickly became Washington's confidant and close friend. He was chosen by the Commander to lead the Continental Army should Washington be killed, injured, or taken captive. Nathanael's vivacious wife Caty, a favorite of the Washingtons, added brightness to the dark, dreary existence of camp life. She proved to be a source of joy and comfort to her husband throughout the war--as well as a heartache and challenge.

It was General Nathanael Greene who pulled the Continental Army from the throes of death at Valley Forge. It was General Greene who petitioned Congress for a Declaration of Independence. It was Nathanael Greene who was given the desperate task of commanding the Southern Department of the Continental Army after other commanders had failed. It was Greene who drove British General Cornwallis to surrender at Yorktown. Unable to participate or witness the victorious battle, he was forced to immediately return South with his troops, and subdue the remaining British forces. Greene led his troops in battle and laid siege for a year after the victory at Yorktown. His persistence finally forced the British to evacuate the South.

Guest speaker for September



Kirk Lovenbury will be the speaker for our September 18th Meeting. Mr. Lovenbury, who retired to Williamsburg in 2009, has been a tour guide at Bruton Parish Church for seven years and will speak on "What you didn't know about religion in Colonial America." The developing differences, over a span of 180 years, between the American and British branches of the Anglican Church will be examined, along with official policy toward other denominations.

Lovenbury was a very popular Christopher Wren teacher for eight years. He has degrees in Anthropology, History and Education. He has spent many years living and teaching abroad and has lived in nine foreign countries, including China, Kenya, Italy, South Africa, Germany and England. He has traveled in more than 100 other countries as well. His favorite pass-time is working on his genealogy and has published a book on his Lovenbury line back to 1100 AD. His computerized ancestry has over 8000 names. He belongs to MENSA

They were commonly known as Maryland Protestant, Pennsylvania, and American Patriot and British Loyalist colonial militias. But unlike militias, the associator military volunteers were exempt from regular mandatory service. 

Washington's Commander-in-Chief Flag

Tradition tells us **George Washington's Commander-in-Chief Flag** was the personal standard of the Commander of the Continental Army everywhere he went. The presence of the flag meant **George Washington** was there. It saw every battle and location that the Commander-in-Chief did during the Revolutionary War. It is unique due to its 6-pointed stars and was allegedly

designed by Washington himself.

George Washington was chosen unanimously by Congress as Commander-in-Chief of the Continental Army on June 19, 1775. He assumed command of the Continental Army on July 3, 1775 at Cambridge, Massachusetts as the Army was surrounding the British Army in Boston. As Commander-in-Chief, George Washington followed typical European tradition by having a flag designed for himself as leader of the army. In those days, monarchs, generals and other leading officials often had their own personal standards. The flag would have been located anywhere General Washington was present, whether on the battlefield, at headquarters or on the march. It is sometimes referred to as the Washington's Headquarters Flag.

IN MEMORIAM

Compatriot Colonel Stephen Ross Norton, USA, Retired, 76, died peacefully in his Williamsburg, VA home on 10 August 2021. Colonel Norton was a career Army soldier, Vietnam veteran, Foreign Area Officer (FAO) specialist, member of the Defense Intelligence Agency (DIA) Senior Executive Corps, member and Compatriot of the Sons of the American Revolution, and a true American Patriot. In 1968, COL Norton received his commission as a 2nd Lieutenant from John Carroll University, Cleveland, OH, thus launching what would be a remarkable and unprecedented 30-year Army career. He is credited with lowering the potential for conflict several times in the Aegean Sea between Greece and Turkey.

After retiring from the Army, COL Norton worked briefly at the Western Policy Center then served as the Senior Policy Advisor for National Security to Senator Saxby Chambliss (R, GA) on Capitol Hill. Shortly thereafter, COL Norton was selected into the Senior Executive Corps as Director of the Defense HUMINT Management Office (DHMO), DIA and subsequently, as Director of Security, DIA. His awards include the Defense Superior Service Medal (2 awards); Legion of Merit (2 awards); Bronze Star Medal (2 awards); Defense Meritorious Service Medal (3 awards); Joint Service Commendation Medal (2 awards); Army Commendation Medal; Joint Service Achievement Medal, DIA Director's Medal (3 awards); Greek Medal of Honor and Merit and is a member of the Defense Attaché Service Hall of Fame, COL Norton will be buried at Arlington National Cemetery at a date to be determined.
