- Encourages Engagement: It motivates chapters to expand their programming, collaborate with local communities, and deepen their commitment to SAR principles.
- Celebrated Nationally: The award is presented at the Annual Congress, often as the culminating moment of the awards ceremony a true spotlight for the chapter's efforts. For Virginia SAR to sweep all three top spots in the 200+ members category this year is a testament to its strategic planning, passionate volunteers, and consistent excellence. 

Topic: George's Oath and Other Revolutionary Documents in the National Archives

September 13, 2025 Meeting Speaker: Stuart Butler

Stuart retired as the assistant branch chief of the Military Archives at the National Archives in Washington in 1999 after thirty years in the U.S. government including three years in the U.S. Army. He attended Florida State and Florida Atlantic Universities and has a M.A. in American History. Since retiring, he has authored four books on Virginia's role in the War of 1812 and has written numerous articles for a variety of historical journals. During the War of 1812 Bicentennial Commemoration in Virginia he served on the Commission's Citizens Council Advisory Council. He has also lectured at the Osher Institute at William and Mary on topics in English medieval history and the War of 1812. He also serves as a judge for Virginia History Day and for the Army Historical Foundation Book awards.

In addition to his SAR membership he is currently the president of the Society of the War of 1812 in Virginia and is also a member of the Jamestown Society and several other lineage societies. He and his wife, Rosanne, celebrated their fiftieth wedding anniversary this year. They have one daughter, Elisabeth, who is the Deputy Archivist of the U.S. Senate.

Revolutionary War History Fact of the Month Submitted by Stuart Butler, Chapter Historian

The Strange Tale of HMS Fowey (Part 2 of 2)

On May 23, 1776, Captain Montague sailed Fowey into Lynnhaven Bay to join Captain Hammond of the frigate Roebuck and several other warships to take Governor Dunmore and his motley band of loyalists and former enslaved Blacks to Gwynn's Island. Here, they established a base of operations from which they hoped to recover the colony for Britain.

On June 17, 1776, Fowey was ordered once again to rescue a royal governor in trouble. This time it was Gov. Robert Eden of Maryland who was politely asked to leave by the patriots leaders of that colony. Fowey arrived in Annapolis on June 23 to rescue the governor and left with the governor on June 26 returning to Gwynn's Island on June 29. Eden later arrived in England on September 2, 1776.

After the Gwynn's Island fiasco, Dunmore on July 28, sailed away with half the ships he had in June. On August 8, 1776, the British armada, including Fowey, left Chesapeake Bay, with some of the ships going to Bermuda, St. Augustine, and the rest to New York. Dunmore would never set foot in Virginia again. Fowey, with Dunmore on board, arrived in New York harbor on September 7, 1776. While in New York, Fowey provided assistance to British forces during the New York campaign. On November 2, 1776, Fowey, with Dunmore aboard, provided convoy protection for over two hundred warships back to England, arriving at Portsmouth on December 2, 1776. At that time Fowey was sent to Chatham dockyard for a refitting during the winter.

Fowey remained in England for refitting at Sheerness for much of 1777. During the summer of 1777 it cruised in the Irish Sea. It returned to America in the summer of 1778 when it was assigned to New York patrolling Long Island Sound. Fowey became part of the British naval force in the defense of Savannah in late 1779. By the end of 1780, Fowey was described as in a deplorable state and probably underwent more repairs at either Chatham or Sheerness. In 1781, Capt. Peter Alpin commanded the ship when it was assigned to the Chesapeake Bay area to aid Cornwallis at Yorktown in the fall of 1781. Along with the schooner Betsy, the 44 gun Charon, Guadeloupe and Vulcan, Fowey met a fiery end from either French bombardment or self-destruction during the siege of Yorktown. So ended Fowey's Revolutionary War odyssey just a few hundred feet from where she had first picked up the beleaguered governor of Virginia in 1775!


The First Amendment



Defending Fort Stanwix: A Story of the New York Frontier in the American Revolution

By William L. Kidder

In *Defending Fort Stanwix*, William L. Kidder tells the dramatic story of "the fort that never surrendered" and the crucial role it played in the American War for Independence. After a series of military defeats over the winter of 1776-1777, British military leaders developed a bold plan to gain control of the Hudson River and divide New England from the rest of the colonies. Three armies would converge on Albany: one under Lieutenant General John Burgoyne moving south from Quebec, one under General William Howe moving north from New York City, and a third under Lieutenant Colonel Barrirmore St. Leger cutting east from Lake Ontario along the Mohawk River. Fort Stanwix lay directly on the path of St. Leger's force, making it a key defensive position for the Continental Army. By delaying St. Leger's troops and forcing a retreat, the garrison's stand at Fort Stanwix contributed to Burgoyne's surrender at the Battle of Saratoga a month later, a major turning point during the war.

Kidder offers an engaging account of life in and around the fort in the months leading up to the siege, detailing the lives of soldiers and their families, civilians, and the Haudenosaunee peoples with a focus on both the mundane aspects of military life and the courageous actions that earned distinction. Defending Fort Stanwix relates the stories of local men and women, both white and Indigenous, who helped with the fort's defense before, during, and after the siege and highlights an exciting, overlooked story of bravery and cooperation on New York's frontier during the American Revolution.

William L. Kidder taught history for more than three decades at the Hun School of Princeton and is a historian, interpreter, and draft horse teamster at the Howell Living History Farm in Hopewell, New Jersey.
