On 30 Oct 2021, Sgt.

LeGrande USA Ret., who is a member of "The Old Guard" spoke at the Providence Classical School on the 100th anniversary of the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier.

Members of the Sons and Daughters of the American Revolution were in attendance and enjoyed a very interesting review of "The Old Guard"

The first Unknown Soldier almost didn't make it back to U.S. soil at all.

Too big to fit through the doors into the USS Olympia, the ship designated to carry the remains back from France, the casket was tied to the deck. But when the Olympia plowed through the remnants of a hurricane, tossed by 20-foot waves, it seemed chancy whether the ship would make it, much less the remains stay on board.

At one point, the captain asked a Navy chaplain, a Catholic priest, to hold a prayer service asking God to preserve ship and soldier.

Capt. Henry Lake Wyman managed to keep the ship afloat, and members of the Marine Corps Honor Guard, which maintained constant watch throughout the storm, lashed themselves to the deck to stay on duty. They even preserved the roses that had been placed on the casket in France, according to historian Patrick K.

O'Donnell's account in "The Unknowns," a history of the war and the tomb.

One hundred years ago Tuesday, the Olympia pulled into the Washington Navy Yard to deliver the remains to an anxious public.





# Flag recognition



# The Easton Flag

You may have heard something about how the 13 original colonies of America declared their independence from Great Britain in 1776?

The various frustrations of the colonists with King George III and his Parliament were put to parchment by a certain Thomas Jefferson, and after a few modifications by Congress the Declaration of Independence was all set to be printed and distributed in early July 1776. By Congress's orders, it was read first read to the public in three places at the same time on July 8, 1776:

Trenton, New Jersey

Philadelphia, Pennsylvania

Easton, Pennsylvania

When the Declaration was read in Easton's Great Square at the old courthouse by Robert Levers county clerk, it is said that the citizens of the town unfurled a flag some local seamstresses had sewn: the flag of Easton that remains so to this day!

Actually, it was referred to as simply "the standard" in a Philly newspaper from that time, a standard representing the 13 rebelling colonies. The primary document doesn't mention what it looked like, however.

The controversy arises from the fact that this would make Easton's flag the first "stars and stripes" flag in America. Yes, the very first "red, white and blue" (not counting Britain's flag).

There were no photographs at that time, so there will probably never be any way to prove the flag that appeared in the Square in 1776 was, in fact, the flag we still have.

The story gets trickier still: The flag disappears from the historical record for 38 years after its supposed introduction. The first time everyone agrees it appears in history is on September 6, 1814 when the current Easton flag was given as a gift to Captain Abraham Horn's 59-strong rifle company as they left to avenge the burning of Washington, DC during the War of 1812 - which this time was not about tea.

It's somewhat surprising, then, that the same puritanical minds also created the first American batch of eggnog at Captain John Smith's 1607 Jamestown settlement.

The word nog comes from the word grog; that is, any drink made with rum. Christmas was so inconsequential in early America that after the Revolutionary War, Congress didn't even bother taking the day off to celebrate the holiday, deciding instead to hold its first session on Christmas Day, 1789. It took almost a century for Congress to proclaim it a federal holiday.
